Role of social learning in animal behaviour. Social learning occurs when other individuals have a direct influence on the acquisition of a new skill. Therefore, this does not include contagion but can occur by imitation, tutoring, mimicry and stimulus enhancement. Contagion involves an animal copying what another animal is doing, using an already known behaviour.
